



The first day commenced with a keynote lecture delivered by Dr. Geranda Notten, University of Ottawa, sponsored by the McCain Family Chair in Food Security, University of Guelph, enlightening attendees on the topic of "Beyond income: The measurement, policy and politics of





poverty in Canada." Geranda discussed material poverty from the perspective of income, food insecurity, and material deprivation. This stimulating discussion was succeeded by seven presentations and a panel discussion, offering diverse perspectives on the conference theme.




Outstanding Master's and Ph.D Thesis Award

These awards recognize excellence in student research at the Master's and Ph.D. levels. The Society is accepting nominations of formally written theses at the Master's level that demonstrate exceptional quality with respect to the subject matter of the research as well as the way the research has been conducted. Master's theses must have been completed in the year previous to the year the award will be given (2022). Ph.D. theses must be completed during the previous three years to the year the award is given (2020, 2021 & 2022). Bioenergy feedstock supply from wheat straw: A farm level model incorporating trade-offs in crop choices, disease risk, and soil fertility



McKnight, Hauer, Luckert, and Feng Qiu have developed a dynamic programming model to examine the relationship between wheat straw supply decisions and the prevailing wheat straw and grain prices. The dynamic model takes into account crucial factors such as crop choices (particularly the trade-offs between wheat and canola concerning disease risk), the immediate benefits farmers might gain from baling and selling wheat straw, and the long-term repercussions, such as the potential adverse effects of removing wheat straw from the soil surface on wheat and canola yields. The authors offer valuable insights into how supply decisions at the farm level can significantly influence soil quality dynamics and shed light on the broader implications of these decisions, including land use change and the sustainability of feedstock supply for biofuels.

Business risk management programs and the adoption of beneficial management practices in Canadian crop agriculture

In this insightful article, De Laporte, Schuurman, Skolrud, Slade, and Weersink examine the relationship between business risk management (BRM) programs and adopting beneficial management practices (BMPs) within Canadian crop agriculture. The authors identify a dearth of research gaps, particularly in exploring the extensive and intensive margin effects of BRM programs in Canada and beyond. They underscore the significance of such studies to ensure





that future BRM programs are designed effectively to encourage the widespread adoption of BMPs to foster climate change adaptation and mitigation.

CJAE Special Issue: Global Dynamics, food markets and the determinants of Canadian food price inflation

We are looking for papers that address topics relevant to our understanding of food price inflation, its causes, and its impact on Canadian households. We will consider research on markets, policies, and data from outside Canada, but are seeking research with results that can inform the Canadian experience and policy debates. Theoretical and empirical papers providing insights into the multifaceted nature of this subject are welcome.

The special issue will be edited by Jill Hobbs (University of Saskatchewan), José Nuño- Ledesma (University of Guelph), and Timothy Richards (Arizona State University), through the usual CJAE manuscript-review process. The review process will include at least two reviewers per paper. In total, we expect to select between 7 to 10 papers for the special issue.

Key Dates

March 1st, 2024: Proposal due. The proposal should be 250 words long, identify authors, research topic, data sources, methods and expected findings. Ideally, the proposal should indicate the progress made so far. Proposals should be submitted to José G. Nuño-Ledesma (Department of Food, Agricultural and Resource Economics, University of Guelph) via email (jnuno@uoguelph.ca).

April 1st: Authors will be notified of preliminary acceptance April 1st or before.

August 1st, 2024: Submission deadline. Authors will submit the paper through the Journal's submission platform and indicate that their submission is for a special issue. Papers will enter a normal review process, so rejection remains a possibility for abstracts that were preliminarily accepted.

November 1st, 2024, first round of reviews due • February 1st, 2025, revised paper due.

April 1st, 2024, second round of reviews due.

June 1st, 2025, final paper due.


